## You tell us what you think in the International Student Barometer

"I have found the Exeter community to be very supportive and welcoming, and I have made many friends from a range of different disciplines."

Thanks to all who participated in the Autumn International Student Barometer. I know that students are bombarded with surveys throughout the year, but the International Student Barometer asks questions specific to international students and really allows us to understand your experience at Exeter. From that data and your comments we can match ourselves against other universities and look at ways to improve what we offer at Exeter. Here are some top results from the survey:

94.2%	thought the Lecturers were expert
92.3%	happy with the safety at Exeter
89.2%	thought Exeter was a good place to be
83.6%	were happy with the support services
76.5%	were happy with arrival services, activities
	and support

But we don't just care about the statistics. When you tell us you are unhappy with certain aspects we listen to your suggestions. You previously told us that you were unhappy with the catering facilities on campus and wanted more international provision. We have definitely seen an improvement in the past year with the introduction of more international food in Refresh, the Queen's Café and the International Mini-market in Cornwall House and this has been reflected in your responses in the survey. We have made many refurbishment changes in the Library following your comments and we are concentrating now on the data network. We know that you aren't happy with the quality of accommodation and other buildings on campus. We are planning a £450 million investment in facilities by the end of the next decade.

This will include a new Business School, state of the art facilities for Biosciences and a redevelopment of the heart of our Streatham campus.

The next International Student Barometer will be held in April. There will be great prizes on offer again. Please do take 10 minutes to complete the questionnaire so that we can be the best university possible!

# Award for research on religious and science education in Islamic counties

Nasser Mansour, a research fellow who recently completed his PhD from the School of Education and Lifelong Learning at the University of Exeter has been awarded the European Educational and Research Association (EERA) Best Paper Award for Postgraduate and Young Researchers.

This prestigious award is for his thesis 'Religious beliefs: A hidden variable in the performance of science teachers in the classroom'.

Nasser is Egyptian and lectured in Science Education at Tanta University in Egypt prior to moving to England for post graduate study. His winning paper focused on the challenges for Islamic cultures to manage the relationship between providing a religious and science education that may be at odds with each other. Controversial issues like evolution, cloning and abortion can pose problems for teaching science. The paper also highlights the need to understand teachers' personal religious beliefs and practices around some of these issues and the way their beliefs influence their performance in the classroom.

Nasser said of his achievement, "I'm really excited and honoured to receive the Best Paper Award, especially at the beginning of my professional career. This encourages me to do much research on this area of religion and science education. I had invaluable support from my thesis supervisors who were able to listen carefully and probe into areas of my research with patience and understanding. The research environment at the University was a great bonus and I feel that this award makes me more confident to present at international conferences."


